2025 Legislative Session

Bills approved by the Governor:

LB 36 (Brandt) Provide for notification of certain regulations and permits to controlling entities by counties, cities, and villages under the Wellhead Protection Area Act; Natural Resources Committee priority bill; Eight bill package which included provisions of LB 595 in support of the Nebraska Mesonet system; Approved by the Governor, estimated effective on September 2, 2025 (pursuant to Article III-27 of the Nebraska Constitution)

LB 43 (DeKay) Updates language from LB 1370 (2024) to define "electric-related" components and allows a one-time certification for distribution utilities and expands the requirement from new construction to now include maintenance and future upgrades to the infrastructure; Approved by the Governor and effective on February 25, 2025

LB 105 (Hughes) Change procedures for voting or election precincts for public power districts; allows public power districts to split voting precincts when determining board member voting districts; introduced on behalf of NREA; Approved by the Governor and effective on April 7, 2025

LB 317 (Brandt) Merges the Departments of Natural Resources with the Department of Environment and Energy and changes the name to the Department of Water, Energy and Environment; Approved by the Governor and effective May 6, 2025

<u>LB 396</u> (DeKay) Change provisions relating to the form and filing of public power district budgets and audits with the Nebraska Power Review Board – Removes the requirement by Public Power Districts to submit an annual budget report to PRB; NPPD priority bill; Approved by the Governor, estimated effective on September 2, 2025 (pursuant to Article III-27 of the Nebraska Constitution)

2025 Legislative Session

Bills approved by the Governor (continued):

LB 526 (Jacobson) Provides powers and duties for public power districts related to cryptocurrency mining operations; Specifically, public power suppliers may impose requirements for infrastructure upgrades; requires that new cryptocurrency operators one megawatt or larger notify their power supplier; requires that power providers publish on their website the number of cryptocurrency operations and annual energy usage; requires that cryptocurrency operators are on an interruptible rate; Approved by the Governor and effective October 1, 2025

LB 660 (Andersen) Provides that to the extent practicable, political subdivisions must only purchase drones or UAVs which are cleared by the State Division of Aeronautics under the Secure Drone Purchasing Act; Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee package; Includes NERC CIP exemption; Approved by the Governor with various effective dates

Bills which failed to advance:

<u>LB 468 (Clements)</u> Change provisions relating to inheritance taxes, change certain fee and tax provisions, and eliminate a sales tax exemption relating to data centers; also doubles nameplate capacity tax; Cloture motion Failed on Select File (31-11-5-2)

Interim Studies

LR 159 (Brandt) Interim study to examine how the nameplate capacity tax affects the development, operation, and long-term viability of privately developed renewable energy generation facilities located in Nebraska; Referred to Natural Resources Committee

LR 225 (Dungan) Interim study to examine the need and implementation of a Green Amendment and the implications of adopting LR 22CA, 2025; Referred to Natural Resources Committee

LR 234 (Storm) Interim study to examine the impact of the net-zero plans and goals of public power utilities; Referred to Natural Resources Committee

LR 250 (Andersen) Interim study to examine whether power companies should be exempt from the Secure Drone Purchasing Act; Referred to Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee

LR 260 (Dover) Interim study to determine the return on investment per kilowatt hour for businesses that chose to locate and set up their businesses in Nebraska; Referred to Revenue Committee

2026 Legislative Session

Carryover Bills from 2025:

LB 349 (Prokop) In 70-1001.01 - Adds a definition for "electric energy storage resource" and amends the definition of an electric supplier to include "any legal entity, <u>public or private</u>, supplying, producing, <u>storing</u>, or distributing..."; amends the definition of a privately developed renewable energy generation facility to include "an electric energy storage resource"; provides a method for "electric energy storage resources" to gain approval at the Power Review Board

<u>LB 413</u> (Clouse) Change provisions relating to the setting of rates by certain power districts; Rates and charges may be differentiated based on load size, load factor, firm and nonfirm service, technology risks, length of service commitment, and other objective criteria.; fair, reasonable, and non not unduly discriminatory...

LB 489 (Brandt) Prohibits the operation, maintenance, construction, or acquiring of transmission lines or related facilities within the state by an entity that is not a public power or other governmental entity providing electric service in the State of Nebraska

LB 503 (Bosn) Allows the designation of American energy friendly counties and changes provisions relating to privately developed renewable energy generation facilities and the nameplate capacity tax

<u>LB 546</u> (Rountree) Allows the Governor to declare an emergency when requested by a political subdivision that supplies electricity, natural gas, water or sewer service
